Summary:

The article "New Cholesterol Advice Startles Even Some Doctors" talks about the new guidelines released by the American College of Cardiology and the American Heart Association, that advise doctors not to prescribe statins or other cholesterol-lowering medications to most people simply based on their cholesterol levels. Moreover, according to Kolata the new guidelines suggest that patients and doctors use a new online risk calculator heart attack or stroke to determine whether there is a need to take a statin (2013). The author mentions the different views held by different doctors on the value of statins and whether maintaining low cholesterol levels is better compared to the high doses of drugs being taken by patients.

The news article discussed above is very relevant to the class. It gives the class a better understanding of the effectiveness of statins which are popular drugs taken by a lot of people. Although the idea presented in the article is still debatable, it will encourage the class to look into other current

researches conducted on the use of statins as a cholesterol-lowering drug. The article chosen is a very good discussion point for the class considering that there are pros and cons on the new guidelines suggested. Whether the new guidelines are to be followed by patients and doctors, the class definitely benefits from the article because of the awareness it creates. It will motivate the students to read on further about the topic. Ultimately, they can intelligently decide which side they will believe.
