Catechism of the Catholic Church Article and article 2 discuss the sacrament of baptism and the sacrament of confirmation respectively. Baptism forms the very foundation of Christianity – through baptism sins are washed away and sinners are made sons of God through Christ Jesus. There are many prefigurations of baptism in the Old Testament: Noah's ark during the great floods, the crossing of the Red Sea by the children of Israel, crossing of the Jordan by the children of Israel among others. Baptism is for every person who has not yet been baptized but not everybody can baptize however in special occasions anybody may undertake baptism.
