## Journalism and the worsening case of privacy invasion - a call for responsible jo...

" Freedom of the press" is derived from the "Universal Declaration of Human Rights" or what is now known as the "International Magna Carta" (Flowers gt. in Papademas 11), which states that all individuals have the freedom to express and impart opinions using the media as a vehicle to convey their thoughts, even in the presence of boundaries (Papademas 11).
