He also won two gold medals (one each in 100 meters and long jump) at the 1988 Seoul Olympics, two gold medals (one each in long jump and as a member of the $4 \times 100$ meter relay team) at the 1992 Barelona Olympics, and one gold medal (in long jump) at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics.

The first syllable of their names reads ‘ Beijing huangying ni,' meaning ‘ Beijing welcomes you."
