Salinger, which was published in 1951. It was originally intended for adults, but has eventually become popular among teenagers as well, because of its genuine way of bringing up teenage confusion, angst, depression and so on. The story being told is that of Holden Caulfield, a clever boy with many inner struggles. Holden grew up in a wealthy home, but became depressed after his younger brother, Allie, died at a young age. After this he began struggling in school and in life. His parents sent him to four different boarding schools, but he was expelled from every single one.

This story takes place in the few days after he leaves the last school, Pencey. Holden does not come off as a particularly warm or sensitive person. There are only a handful of people he respects, and most of these belong to his family.
